

ur first meeting of the year will feature the distinguished history professor, Dr. Gerald Poyo, speaking about the Hispanic origins of San Antonio in the 18th Century. Dr. Poyo has been a history professor at St. Mary's University since 1992, and most recently was O'Connor Chair for the History of Hispanic Texas and the Southwest. The author of several books, he draws upon his Cuban heritage, his growing-up years in South America and his academic journeys in the United States to guide his teaching and research. He holds a bachelor's degree from the University of South Carolina, master's degree from the

University of Texas at Austin, and PhD from the University of Florida.
